FIRST VICE PRESIDENTIAL VARISCITES

"Well, winter is clearly at hand in our Northwestern U.S. and we already miss 2 things: rockhounding trips and warm sunny days. How about combining both those wintertime desires with an educational vacation trip to boot? Consider making a trip to the massive series of Tucson Arizona Gem and Mineral "shows" (fossil, jewelry, beads, and tools/equipment shows, too) sometime between ~January 29th and February 17th, 2019. There are truly thousands of individual dealer rooms and booths to browse and always new material at reasonable prices that surfaces at Tucson each year. A key period for most us mineral hobbyists is Feb 8 - Feb 17th, with the actual Tucson club show (the "Main Show") in the Convention Center including world-class speaker presentations as well as all the best US and international dealers is scheduled for Feb 14 - 17. There is no way to properly describe what this "Tucson Show" event is really like; you just have to experience it at least once in your "rockhound" lifetime. Having grown up in Tucson starting as a 13-year-old teenager in 1949, I've seen it from its inception and marveled at what the local club has developed there and what "The Show" has become internationally. When I wanted to get an emerald for a ring for my wife Carol in the late 1980s, we stopped at a Tucson Show hotel-room vendor shop of a Colombian emerald miner and from the array of faceted Coscuez emeralds he poured onto the table, we picked a very nice one; then went to a jewelry designer vendor at a Main Show booth with a sketch of a ring setting with accent stones and had them make it over the next few months. We attended a California-area show later that Spring at which the designer vendor had a booth, took delivery of the ring, and had the Tucson-purchased emerald set into it on the spot. Great ring, great prices, and great memories!!

Why not try attending this year? For a list of the many individual multi-dealer "shows" and their dates and locations of operation, try accessing the master schedule at website http:// www.tucsongemshows.net/coming.html. Gas prices are reasonable, and you might even find a "cheapie" airline that services Mesa/Phoenix where you could rent a car, and even drive to Quartzite, AZ, to check those shows, before proceeding to Tucson. I usually drive the 1200 miles from Montana so that I have my 4x4 250,0000-mile truck available to both rockhound in the area and to carry materials back to the Club in Bozeman without having to ship them.

Yes, rents can be high in Tucson during the peak period of that show, but we've had good luck each year finding reasonable rental rooms on the edge of town, or very reasonable Airbnb rooms — from which we can drive easily to any of the hundreds of event venues. This has to be a MUST for any rockhound's "bucket list." Why not this year???

Should you decide not to go this year, don't pass up attending one of the 2019 shows in a region of our own Northwestern Federation — perhaps a big one in an adjacent State. You'll find their dates and show-points-of-contact at website http://www.rockngem.com/ShowDatesFiles/ ShowDatesDisplayAll.php?ShowState=ALL — that is, if the Club's leaders have notified the Federation and Rock and Gem magazine of its show dates and locations early enough for you to make plans."


Find out if you have the desire and talent for writing by serving others through your writing. Maybe you will find out that you enjoy it so much that you end up wanting to edit you club newsletter.

True, you take on the job of organizing such things as procuring a room and making arrangements for the banquet, etc. But, you do all this planning with the idea of having your costs covered by your dealer fees (perhaps you can charge a bit more since it would be a Federation Show), entrance fees and charge for the banquet. Things don't have to cost a great deal of money. I have seen many creative people in clubs who can come up with spectacular centerpieces and favors, as well as great ideas for logistics and advertising with little or no cost.

With that being said, I am offering to talk to your club about putting on a show; and I am also going to "stick my neck out" and offer to act as registrar for any club that decides they could put on a show. The registrar is responsible for all the pre-registration. I am also willing to offer any guidance you may need as you proceed. So, make my "high hopes" come to fruition and put in a bid for the 2020 Show. . or for 2021, or 2022!!!

The one dealer space that should interest all of us was the IDAHO GEOLOGICAL SURVEY, based at the University of Idaho in Moscow. The Idaho Geological Survey has a large data base on many of the Geological facets of the State of Idaho. The one that interested me most was the Mining Claims. Reed Lewis who was at the table said that the Idaho Geological Survey had an interactive map of all the mining claims in the state in their data base along with who applied for the claim, the GPS coordinates to pin point the location of the claim, and a whole lot of other stuff about the claim such as what the material that they were mining for. Anyway, you could spend hours going through the material in the Idaho Geological Survey data base this winter while you are waiting for the snow to melt and the mud to dry out so that you can get out and play in the dirt next spring. This year CFMS has submitted several letters to the BLM and USFS on preserving Recreational Rockhounding as a Recreational Activity in the Southern California Deserts including the Western Mojave Management Plan (WEMO), Desert Renewable Energy Conservation Plan (DRECP) and the Sequoia National Forest where over 17,000 acres of public lands are being proposed for closure to access for any recreational activities.

I constantly send out info from Western Caucus to our Oregon Council of Rock and Mineral Clubs. And any information I receive from Shirley Leeson concerning our Federal Lands and Recreational Rockhounding. I also sent in an Objection Letter to Washington DC concerning the Huge Plans for the Blue Mountain Forest in Washington and Oregon State (Mostly the forests are in Oregon). How many of you have visited Washington, DC and visited your Congressman or Senator's office? I can say, I'm among those who have never had the opportunity of visiting my Congressman or Senator's Washington office. But, those same Congressmen and Senators have offices and staff in your area....so much closer for a visit. So, here's my thought..... Why not set up a visit to either your Congressman

or Senators local office and get to know the staff members there. Let them know you're a 'Recreational Rockhound' and explain what 9+1 is and what it means to you. Bring a small gift with you...something a staff member can display on their desk, something you found, cut and polished with a note on where it came from.....especially if it came from public lands within the Congressman's district. If this isn't possible, make sure the staff knows where the material came from....public lands, designated as multiuse public lands. You might even bring a gift of a piece of material that can no longer be collected because of special interest restrictions. Show the staff what it's like to know beautiful material is 'out there' but now unavailable because

of restrictions. Those restrictions could be the fact that vehicles can no long go on the roads and trails they once traveled because of 'wilderness' restrictions, or material that can no long be gathered because you can't penetrate the earth to reach your objective in restrictive areas.

Offer help to the staffVolunteer your time and expertise. Let them know you are there for them; they can count on you for help. Find out if your Congressman is on the Natural Resources Committee and if so, offer to do research for the staff members on current projects.


