



Be an advocate for your hobby. An advocate is a "person who publicly supports or recommends a particular cause or policy." This is an important time for rockhounds to speak up and be part of the process to ensure that our public lands remain open to the collecting of rocks, minerals, and fossils.

There are several things you can do:

- Contact your BLM and NFS regional and state offices and ask to be put on their mailing list for road closure and land use planning. This is the easiest way to find out about the proposed changes to the use of public lands. Find opportunities to assist the local BLM and NFS with cleanup projects or other ways you can help them.
- Become a member of your local 4-Wheel Drive club. They are active in many states and work to keep roads open in many of the areas where you rockhound.
- Become a member of the American Lands Access Association (ALAA). They promote the right of the amateur hobby collecting, recreational prospecting and mining on public lands. They need your help is need in monitoring the changes to the public land use in your area.
 - Write your congressmen and let them know of your concerns with the proposed changes to public land use.
 - Contact your local officials and let them know of your concerns
- Encourage your fellow rockhounds to become active. The more voices, the more effective you can be to influence the use of public lands.

BLM and NFS personnel work hard to implement the laws Congress passed concerning use of our public lands. The corner stone of BLM and NFS management of public lands is a written notification of a proposed change in the use of public lands (road closures, land withdrawal, grazing, etc.); public hearings to collect comments on the proposal from the stakeholders (users of the public lands); a published draft decision; and public comment of the draft decision and a published final decision. It is important to be part of the process from the initial proposed changes through to the final decision.

Don't get mad - get involved. Speak up, write letters, attend meetings and promote your hobby.

IRISH ROCKHOUNDING

Due to this lovely winter weather, I have not been able to obtain my predecessor's records for the NFMS and present you with an article about NFMS history. I have chosen to write about the rocks I encountered while traveling in Ireland this past Oct/Nov.! They so intrigued me as would be any rockhound.

After visiting Dublin, I drove down to the Wicklow Mountains and Glendalough (County Wicklow, Republic of Ireland) where I found SCHIST attracting my eyes d/t its mica content. While staying in Doolin (Republic of Ireland), I visited the beautiful Cliffs of Moher observing SEDIMENTARY ROCK formations. After leaving the Cliffs, I drove through pathways of LIMESTONE in the Burren (County Clare, Republic of Ireland). From the Burren, I drove to the Giant's Causeway (County Antrim, Northern Ireland) with massive octagonal BASALT stone which looks like a pathway to the visible Scotland coast. On the way to the Giant's Causeway, I found a windy road to the North Atlantic Ocean. It turned out to be White Rocks Beach (near Portrush, County Antrim, Northern Ireland) with excellent view of Dunluce Castle (all castles were built with local rock). But the most impressive scene to me was the white rocks along the beach. These rocks were protected with fencing covering them. I did manage to find several small white rocks washed ashore (probably not plagioclase phenocrysts or Basalt porphyrite because these are described as microscopic not hand size or larger).

Our Idaho area has a lot of Basalt rock d/t our history of volcanic explosions and water coverage. I wondered why Ireland was covered in lots of basalt but it looked quite different from ours here in Idaho that I had been exposed to over the past 5 years after my move from upstate NY. The Basalt rocks in Ireland were not only black with holes but I was told by an Irish tour guide that the brown rocks I found were also Basalt. After reading about the stones of Ireland and their formation, I tend to believe that it is the porous Sandstone and not Basalt. (I welcome comments on these rocks I found!). The Stone Circles I visited were spiritually enhancing as I also use my stones for healing purposes.

When customs looked through my suitcase, they commented on all the stones I brought back! Unlike in the national parks here in the states where rockhounding can be illegal, picking up rocks in Ireland and Northern Ireland was quite legal! I would be willing to share with others to see my stones from Ireland.




I began field collecting while pursuing several degrees in education and chemistry at the University of Arizona, 1954 - 1960, and continued to collect during my follow-on Army and private-life careers -- and after full retirement (2010). A member of 11 different clubs in 5 different AFMS Regions since 1972, I have most often served as field trip leader or program chairperson, rather than as an elected officer, primarily because of the Army practice of moving officers from assignment to assignment every few years. Since partially retiring in 2004, I have taken an active role in the local Bozeman, MT club, serving as program chair (since 2009), President, Executive Board member, Trustee of a valuable club-owned historical collection, field trip leader, Board member of the Montana Council, Club bylaws drafter, lecturer/presenter at area schools, fund-raising auctioneer, Club coordinator for its mining claims, commenter on proposed federal regulations and draft NEPA documents related to recreation on (and access to) national forest and BLM lands, and work on many other committees and show-related task groups that support club activities. I have assisted in organizing the annual "Montana Crystal Collectors" meeting by arranging speakers, giving presentations, and conducting fund-raising auctions. In 2014-2015, I organized gathering (on loan) the best samples of club-member-collected Montana minerals, purchased insurance, then transported and displayed the large collection at the annual Tucson Gem and Mineral Club show in February, 2015.

Articles I have written on reviewing and commenting on federal-project draft NEPA documents and on club growth have appeared in past NFMS newsletters, and an article on the uniquely gemmy serpentine mineral Williamsite I've collected from the Maryland/Pennsylvania state line is posted on MINDAT/GEMDAT and has appeared in club newsletters, such as that of the Mineralogical Society of the District of Columbia (Dec. 2013).

With great volunteer support, membership in our Bozeman club has increased from approximately 37 in 2007 to 200 as of mid-January 2017. The club has also recently opened a lapidary clubhouse, and placed a large display of Montana minerals at the Bozeman/Yellowstone International Airport. Our fund-raising auctions, raffles, and show profits have enabled us to be financially stable. I hope to share the many "Lessons-Learned" from my experiences (both in the Bozeman club and others of which I've been a member) with the wider NFMS family.

My home library collection is approximately 8,000 - 10,000 books/journals, approximately 1/3 of which are related to mineralogy, geology, "gold -rush" history, mining, lapidary, field collecting, and other earth science and general science topics; I have a large collection of minerals in home display cases as well. These also speak to my passion for this hobby. My current more-technical interests are on the pegmatites of the Boulder Batholith, and the fate of proposed federal agency regulations that threaten the collecting and National Forest/BLM-access aspects of our hobby. I look forward to meeting as many of you as possible within our NFMS Region over the next several years.





Public Lands

The January 2017 issue of the Northwest Newsletter Vol. 57 No. 1, had an article written by John Martin titled "Rockhound Soapbox- Rockhounding on Public Lands", which I thought was very good and timely as we get ready for a summer of collecting. I believe that for the State of Washington collectors I would like to provide some additional information help understand governmental terminology. The Code of Federal Regulations Part 8365 of Title 43 CFR, and Part 8360.5 under definitions states that "(d)Public lands means any lands and interests in lands owned by the United States and administered by the Secretary of the Interior through the Bureau of Land Management without regard to how the United States acquired ownership." Other definitions have expanded that public lands include lands managed by Bureau of Land Management, also the following are normally included; United States National Park Service, Fish and Wildlife Service under the Department of Interior, and United States Forest Service under the Department of Agriculture. In the State of Washington, we also have the United States Department of Defense

Continuing the "public lands" definition we need to consider how the state land fits into this definition. All states have some lands under state management, such as; state parks, state wildlife management areas, and state forest. Each western state received "public lands" as trust lands designated for specific beneficiaries. These trust lands cannot any longer be considered public lands as allowing any benefits to the "public" would be in breach of loyalty to the specific beneficiaries. The trust lands are to provide revenue for public schools and official state construction of building. This definition is from Wikipedia under Public Lands and it is consistent with other listing of definitions. In Washington State, the State management of their lands is very different from the federal government, which means very little collecting on State lands in Washington. Our neighboring states treat rockhounding different, so a person should check with each state as to their requirements and restrictions.

The following data is primarily from Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia, the different agencies and various state office websites, and it has provided listings of areas and acreages. This is included to review the relationship between federal lands and state land, also a relationship between states.

The total acreages for the state of Washington is; 42,693,760 and the federal acreages is 12,176,293 or 28.5%. That 12,176,293 is a sum of the following major federal agencies; BLM (Bureau of Land Management)- 429,083 acres, Forest Service - 9,323,705 acres, Fish and Wildlife - 150,024 acres, National Parks Service – 1,834,543 acres and Department of Defense – 438,938 acres.

Washington's total land area is 42.5 million acres. Half of this is forested. Nearly 36% of the forestland is privately owned, and 64% is managed by the government.

Washington's total land of 42.6 million acres, the Forest Service has 9.3 million acres or 22% of the land and BLM has less than 1%. Other states are listed below. Of the Forest Service land about half of the forest service land has been designated as Wilderness (Washington has 30 wilderness areas in our 6 National Forest plus 3 other National Forest's we share with Idaho or Oregon).

The relationship of acreage and federal lands with our neighboring states are list here: Idaho- total land—53.5 million acres, Forest Service 20.5 million or 38%, BLM 11.9 million or 22%; Oregon – total land 68.0 million acres, Forest Service 15.7 million or 23%, BLM 15.7 million or 23%; and Montana – 94.1 million acres, Forest Service 17 million or 18%, BLM 8.0 million or 8.5%


Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) manages over 3,000,000 acres of land and 2,600,000 acres and aquatic (shorelines, tidelands, land under Puget Sound, and area lakes) areas.

Washington may have some restrictions for collecting, but we still have many sites that are available for collecting. Many of these sites are on Forest Service land, other sites are on private lands and/or other governmental managed lands. It is important to know the land ownership of our collecting sites and support their requirement so that we can continue pursue our hobby of noncommercial rockhounding.

Good hunting for that special specimen for your collection.

I am sure by now you have all heard or read something about the new rule or regulation being proposed by the BLM on Fossil Collecting on Public Land managed by the BLM. The Regulation is further implementation of the Paleontological Resources Preservation Act of 2009 (PRPA). The public comment period ended on February 6, 2017.

There was a large effort originating in California by the Southern California Paleontological Society, a member of CFMS, to draft a letter of concern and submit during the public comment period. The letter was drafted and circulated throughout the CFMS and to the other Regional Federations for review. Several good articles were written and circulated during this time period on the subject and the impact of the

proposed Regulation by several federation members.

Some of the contributors of articles were Mike Nelson, Lisbet Thorsen, Andrew Hoekstra and Karol McQueary. I would like to thank them for their enormous effort they put forth in the research and documentation required to formulate the response letter. Karol and Lisbet did an outstanding job of getting the response letter out to a multitude of clubs/societies, professional organizations and all of the regional federations.

You were asked to read the information and encouraged to be a signatory on the official letter. That was sent to the BLM on February 6, 2017. If you were one of those signatories on Karol's letter I want to thank you for your participation. By adding your name to the letter you did two things. First you showed your concern for the rule making process and your willingness to make your voice heard on this important issue on the future of legal fossil collecting on Public Lands. Second, by adding your information to the letter, you are now on record and if and when there is another comment period, you will be allowed to add more comments to the record.

So, thank you to all of the people, Clubs, Societies and groups which added your names to the letter.
