

2014 NFMS Scholarship Honorees ** Lyle and Audrey Vogelpohl ** By Don Innes

Beginning in 1965, one student received an AFMS scholarship grant of \$300.00 per year for two years to help achieve an advanced degree in any of the Earth Sciences. This scholarship has increased over time until in 2009-2010 additional funds were raised to allow the educational grants to increase to a single \$4,000 educational grant starting with 12 students selected in the 2009-10 school year.


Each participating Regional Federation selects their own Honorary Award Winner who then selected the school(s) and assisted with the selection of the student, or students, who then received the scholarship grant(s). This year the Northwest Federation's Honorees are Lyle and Audrey Vogelpohl.

Lyle and Audrey Vogelpohl in 1968 went looking for a family hobby and found a hobby and a multitude of like minded friends. To this day they continue being active participants in the West Seattle Rock Club. They added the Northwest Federation of Mineralogical Societies when Lyle was appointed NFMS Treasurer in 1976. He was re-elected 4 times and then continued by being elected Vice-President and then serving as the NFMS President in 1981-1982. During this same time Audrey was NFMS Directory and Advertising Chair.

In 2000 when Toby Cozens resigned as NFMS Treasurer due to poor health, Lyle was again appointed to fill the position. Annually he has been re-elected and continues to handle the NFMS funds. Since 2003 Audrey has chaired various committees of the NFMS - Resolutions, Directory and is currently Juniors Chair.

Lyle and Audrey have attended as participants or teachers at the NFMS Rockhound Retreat since its inception in 2005. They each share their own facet of the hobby as speakers and demonstrators at clubs and shows around the Northwest including being leaders at the Labor Day Family Lapidary Weekend put on by the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry in Central Oregon.

They agree "this is a family hobby which we continue to enjoy in all of its aspects. Thank you for the honor of being able to select the next scholarship recipients looking to complete their graduate studies in the Earth Sciences."



The Multi-Federation Field Trip Terry, Montana July 31, August 1, 2, 3, 2014 By Doug True, NFMS Field Trip Chair

We are having a great response to the Terry Fieldtrip, have been getting lots of questions and signups.

At the time of this printing all of the RV parks in Terry are full (34 spaces) The Hotel/ Motels are full (48 rooms) We have lots of RV dry camping and Tent spaces. But if you want a Motel or RV space you will have to make reservations in Miles City, Mt. about 37 miles away (30 minutes) drive.

Four Full days of fun, 3 days of fieldtrips. The present plans call for 3 trips

per day to the Yellowstone River for 3 days, 2 trips to the hunt for cretaceous sea fossils and I am working on one per day to trip for Dinosaur fossils.

Because our trips are during the dry (fire season) we will be using buses for transportation to the gravel bars on the river plus several autos in case someone needs to return to the park.

We will be staggering the trips with 4-5 hours collecting each day. All of our trips will be on a first come first served. Signups will start on Wednesday 30 July and Thursday morning the 31st. If we need to add more trips for the river or Sea fossils we will. The Dino trips might be limited. You will not go back to the same location, Each day is a new spot.

Agate hunting success will depend on three things. The amount of ice on the river this winter, ice jams open up new material and it looks good thus far. Then high water in the spring and summer will wash and sometimes clean the rock. And last but not least your ability to be able to spot them. There is also lots of Petrified Wood, and Jaspers to be collected. I will have 8-10 fieldtrip leaders to help make your trip successful.

As you may have noticed our trips will run between 4-6 hours each day, temperatures in August can run between 85- 95 degrees, sometimes even higher, we don't want anyone getting heat stroke and we want to enjoy all of the fun at the park.

You will be collecting on dry river gravels, sagebrush areas and could encounter a rattlesnake now and then and some time ticks and except for the river always cactus. You need to plan your clothing for the trip. Long pants, Hats, good shoes, sun block and plan to have lots of water. When you get back to camp a pool and showers will be waiting for you, a beautiful park with lots of shade and then things start to happen.

Once a rockhound, always a rockhound

Local rockhounds stumble across collection from one of Oregons first rockhounds: Klondike Kate

Retired logger Chuck Rollins is holding up a huge chunk of rock in his backyard as it starts to rain in the small, almost hidden town of Latourell Falls in the Columbia River Gorge.

To some it's merely a rock, but for rockhounds like Rollins, it is 100 pounds of moss agate studded with beautiful quartz crystals, and a rare slice of Oregon history.

"Oregon is renowned for its minerals," said Rollins, his house an old saloon and museum of rocks he's collected in 50 years he's lived in the Gorge. "Agates, jasper and petrified woods. Almost any stream or gravel bar, you can find them," he said.

As president of the Columbia Gorge Rockhounds, a club formed in 1951 by a group of friends who relish in the search and study of rocks, Rollins is interested in keeping the hobby of rockhounding alive.

This year, the 25-member rock club, which meets every third Friday night at the Corbett Fire Hall, plans to build a "rockhound memorial wall" honoring rockhounds from the past, present and future.

Teaming up on the project with the Crown Point Historical Society, of which Rollins is also president, the organizations plan to install the rock wall on 2.7 acres of property they've purchased across the street from the fire hall. "We are going to use rocks from all over the state to represent what rockhounds went out to collect," Rollins said.

While researching some of Oregon's earliest rockhounds, Rollins said he was surprised to learn one of the first documented was not only a woman but a young vaudeville actress and dancer who rose to fame during Alaska's Yukon gold rush.

The charismatic 28-year-old redhead Kate Rockwell captured the hearts of miners as a stage performer in Dawson City and earned the name "Klondike Kate," queen of the Yukon. But after losing her fortune in an unlucky love affair, Kate eventually found her way to central Oregon, where she could find peace of mind, Rollins said.

In 1914, Kate built a cabin in the Oregon high desert and homesteaded more than 320 acres of her land claim near Brothers. The former darling, who humored miners as they serenaded her with songs and paid her in gold nuggets that they tossed onstage, began picking up rocks. First on foot or horseback, then driving a beat-up old Model T around the desert, she searched for them.

"She had a passion for rock hunting and picked them up every chance she could, saying they were pieces of the earth that held secrets, wonder and knowledge," Rollins said. Over the years, Kate acquired a magnificent collection of petrified woods, huge agates, geodes, jasper, thunder eggs, obsidian and multi-colored semiprecious stones.

Eventually Kate sold her homestead and moved to Bend, where she built herself a porch and a chimney out of her rock collection. Staying active in the community, she became known as "Aunt Kate" to locals. "Many believe she was one of Oregon's first rockhounds," Rollins said. Twenty years after she died, her chimney was torn down, and the rocks were allegedly split up between three contractors. Interestingly enough, a large portion of Klondike Kate's chimney has found its way to Corbett to be included in the rockhound memorial wall.

Fellow Columbia Gorge rockhound Steve Wheeler tells the rest of the story. Wheeler, a Corbett resident, said he's been a rockhound

his whole life, starting as a little kid when he would go hunting for rocks with his dad in parts of Oregon and Washingotn. "It's exciting to find something beautiful," Wheeler said. "You find a big crystal or agate and nobody else has ever seen it. Then maybe you can turn it into something."

One day in October, Wheeler was on Craigslist looking up petrified wood when he saw an ad: Klondike Kate's chimney for sale. A man was charging \$2,000 or best offer. Wheeler told Rollins — both were familiar with Kate's story — and the club president said he'd be thrilled to include her collection in the rockhound memorial wall. Rollins ask a friend in Bend to go check it out. He gave the man some cash, and the rest was donated.

Soon after, three Gorge rockhounds were hauling 700 pounds of "some of the finest and most interesting rocks in Oregon" by trailer back to Latourell Falls, where it lies spread out in Rollins' backyard.

The giant moss agate with crystals is one of Kate's finds. He picks up another. It is agate limb cast, created long ago with the help of a volcano. "You really have to work hard to find stuff like that now," Rollins said. "Back then you could just pick it off the ground." Volcanic ash burned a hollow cavity in the log, which filled with liquid rock or silica, and pressure crystallized the middle into agate and other rock forms. "It takes millions of years," Rollins said.

Agate colors come from different elements in the soils — green from copper, red from iron, blues, pinks and yellows. "The more colors the better (and more valuable)," Rollins said. Searching for the most beautiful ones is part of the addiction for rockhounds. Kate's rocks will join those collected by Gorge rockhounds, including agates from the Columbia River and petrified woods from local creek beds, in the wall.

To fund its construction, Rollins plans to sell \$100 memorial bricks to people who would like to contribute to remembering Oregon's early rockhounds. Rollins said it's a hobby that's been enjoyed by Oregon families for more than 100 years. He also hopes to reach out to other rock clubs to include in the project.

The wall will be approximately 20 feet long, up to 5 feet high and 3 feet wide, Rollins said. "There will be a bench at the end of the wall where you can sit and watch sunsets," he said. "Kate loved sunsets." Her life motto, said Rollins, was "Smile and mush on."


2014 NFMS Mid-Year Meeting April 26, 2014

Most clubs are always looking for ways to get younger children interested in Rocks and Rockhounding. To promote their annual gem and mineral show and increase interest amongst grade school aged youth, the Marcus Whitman Gem and Mineral Society of Walla Walla, borrowing an idea from the Hells Canyon Gem Club, created a competition between the various grade schools in the local area.

The winner was 9 year old Nova Garner, a 3rd grade student at the school.

Come On Down To Hermiston and The Biggest Little Show in Town

Since the 2014 Federation Show will be in our little Eastern Oregon berg, we thought we would like to introduce you with a brief history. On July 10, 1907, the town of Hermiston was incorporated. Between 1906 and 1908, the federal government built the first part of the Umatilla Irrigation Project funded by the 1902 Reclamation Act. The project resulted in a large-scale development to divert water from the Umatilla River to farmers' fields in northern Umatilla County. By 1920, there were 20,000 acres of irrigated land that produced crops of grains, peas and potatoes that were shipped by rail and river to Portland markets.

In 1941, the U. S. Army acquired nearly 100,000 acres of land near Hermiston where workers built the Umatilla Ordnance Depot. As many as 7.000 workers moved to the area to construct and work at the depot. In 1962, the army began to store chemical weapons at the depot. The depot is now closed, weapons have been safely disposed of and complete dismantling is taking place. The land will revert to multipurpose use in the future.

In 1947, the Army Corps of Engineers erected McNary Dam on the Columbia River. Congress awarded the first contract for construction in April, 1947. By 1950, part of the lock, fishway and spillway rose above ground on the Washington shore. A year later barges headed upriver. Construction was completed in 1954, with all power units in operation by February 1957.

In the 1970's a widespread development in the agricultural industry took place with construction of large potato processing plants such as Lamb-Weston and J. R. Simplot. As Hermiston grew, businesses invested in the area. Some major contributions to the area's growth were Union Pacific Railroad's development of Hinkle Terminal, Marlette Homes, Inc. manufacturing plant, and a Wal-Mart Distribution Center. Two Rivers Prison nearby has also provided growth and jobs for the area.

From modest beginnings, Hermiston has become a modern, progressive city as the largest city in Eastern Oregon with a little over 17,000 people. As our new Logo reads, Hermiston, You Can Grow Here.



REGULATION NATION – Our Public Lands

In his book, "Public Lands – Public Debates" (OSU Press/2012), Author Char Miller points to a November 2006 memorandum of understanding that the BLM and the Forest Service signed in partnership with the US Fish & Wildlife Service and the National Parks Service. This pact committed the four agencies "to carry out shared joint management activities to achieve mutually beneficial resource management goals".

This is now all playing out and unfolding as the Federal land management agencies promote the implementation of their Travel Management Plans (FS), Resource Management Plans (BLM), and the Endangered Species Act

(USFWS) throughout the country. These agencies have lost their capacity to listen to the American people and address their varied concerns regarding the nature of public lands management.

As I have written before, it has become increasingly clear to me that the underlying intent and mission of our federal land management agencies is to restrict and limit the recreating public's ability to use and enjoy the public lands in a multitude of ways. As we begin this new year, let me say again that the future of our Public Lands and the access and use we enjoy on them are more threatened and in danger than at any time in the past.

No relief is in sight from the onslaught of regulations which are being proposed to guide and govern our Public Lands over the next 15-20 years. With a congress that is stagnated and fiscally corrupted one can only hope that common sense, honesty and integrity will someday return to the American scene. However, until that happens, which is unlikely, rock hounds, recreationalists and the public in general will continue to get the short end of the stick.

On a more positive note, the Bureau of Land Management in conjunction with other agencies within the Department of the Interior will waive recreation related fees for visitors to the National System of Public Lands for Martin Luther King, Jr. Day (Jan 20), Presidents Day weekend (Feb 15-17)

National Public Lands Day (Set 27), and Veterans Day (Nov 11) in 2014.

BLM Deputy Director Linda Lance said, "I'm pleased to announce the fee-free days for 2014 and I invite people to take full advantage of these opportunities to explore and enjoy their public lands. BLM-managed lands offer more diverse recreational opportunities than any other federal agency."


