REVISIONS TO AFMS UNIFORM RULES

In the past the Lillian Turner Junior Award, presented at the AFMS Annual Show, has been presented to the Junior with the best competitive exhibit. In the event there are no Junior entries in competition, this award will now be given to the best non-competitive Junior case, as determined by a team of two (2) persons appointed by the Rules Chair.

Addition to rules for Jewelry - Wire Wrapping. Under variety of work for DST-6, one item should now use four wires to make the outside frame.

Change to Out-of-Class for Petrified Wood. The past rule included (f) Any tumbled stones except as minor background material in Class G-6, Diorama. The revised rule deletes the word "any".

Change to Out-of-Class rules for Scrimshaw. This section will now read: All contemporary ivory (already banned by the AFMS) and related materials banned by the Federal Government or by specified state or local laws are therefore illegal and any exhibit using this material will be disqualified. Ivory guidelines will derive from information from US Government authorities. Cast work material or surface coloration of materials is ruled Out-of-Class. Five (5) points will be deducted from the total score for each Out-of-Class item.

ADVANCING AT THE RETREAT

This article owes many of the following ideas to an excellent editorial in the Journal of Nursing Scholarship (Second Quarter, 2006) by Sue Thomas Hegyvary.

Competitive racecar drivers and cyclists know that if they haven't already crashed, they will one day. Nurses and physicians also know they will make mistakes, not to mention authors, teachers, politicians, and so on. And, does anyone believe judges of competitive exhibits at gem and mineral shows should be exempt from mistakes? In fact, I have yet to talk with anyone who has served as such a judge who failed to admit at least one mistake.

Crashes or mistakes occur for many reasons. In the case of judges, mistakes may occur because of a lack of knowledge of the rules or a lack of experience with the materials being judged or even a lack of equipment, such as a 10-power

microscope for the judging of faceted stones. Besides knowledge and experience, judgments of mineral or lapidary cases often occur in a distracting, noisy environment with some pressure to get the job done quickly. In addition, judges at gem shows work in teams of two or three, and the person with the most influential personality can overwhelm the others. Then, in an atmosphere of excitement and charged emotion, hasty judgments can be reached.

In some 30 years of competing, I have not experienced 'mistakes' because of ethical violations, though I have listened to the complaints of others about favoritism or personal vendettas. These latter mistakes can be considered deliberate as opposed to the vast majority of mistakes by judges that can be considered accidental or due to carelessness.

At the Retreat in September at Camp Hancock, we are going to try to reduce error by discussing in detail the American Federation of Mineralogical Society's Uniform Rules. We will practice applying those rules and review standards of conduct for judges. Perhaps by means of such seminars, we can reduce the number of times we quote Alexander Pope's dictum that to err is human. Perhaps, too, we can reduce the number of depressed judges who wring their hands with regret after a mistake and vow never to judge again. We need good judges both new and experienced. Please consider joining us for an interesting and challenging week.

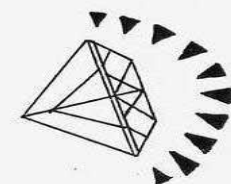
