Directions to this dig site are as listed. I will only give directions to the turn off from County Road 8. The reason for this is there are a number of people that always have to get there first and or will come in and park in the middle of the road or an area that would not be appropriate for laying out the parking area. When people arrive to this point there will be markers giving directions to the dig area and to the camp area if different from dig site. Details are still being worked out with the BLM. If you are coming from the east: From Farson, Wyoming go east 21.3 miles on Wyoming 28 to Sweetwater County Road 8, turn right and go north 11.3 miles, on the right will be a dirt road. At this point follow the markers we will have for set out for you.


If you are coming from the west on I-80 take exit 83 west of Green River, to Wyoming 372 drive 27 miles north and turn right on Wyoming 28, drive 6.7 miles east to County Rd 8, turn left and drive 11.3 miles.

Check your Wyoming map and find Farson and Green River and work from these locations. There are number of items being discussed with the BLM at this point and will be updated as we get closer to dig time. There might even be some special instructions when you arrive.

YOUR RELATIONSHIP TO IT AND HOW IT WORKS



The NFMS has various committees to meet the goals of the NFMS. Some of these committees are directly allied to some of the AFMS committees. The NFMS committee chairman of these allied committees are suppose to contact and work closely with the AFMS committee chairman. The reason is to be sure that the individuals in the NFMS receive proper recognition at the AFMS level. By ensuring that AFMS requirements are met the individual will be recognized at the AFMS level. Some of the NFMS committees that should mirror the AFMS committees, for reason of competition are:

All American Club, AFMS Club Rockhound of the Year, AFMS Newsletter, Bulletin Editor Hall of Fame, Bulletin Editors Advisory, Conservation and Legislation, Judges Training Seminar, Juniors Programs, Program Competition, Publications, Public Relations, Safety, Uniform Rules, URC Eligibility Files, Ways and Means, Website/Webmaster. Other AFMS committees that members of the NFMS need to be aware of are:

Boundaries, Bylaws Revisory, Central Office Administrator, Commemorative Stamps, Endowment Fund, Historian, International Relations, Long Range Planning, Nominating, Parliamentarian, Past President's Advisory, Photography, Show Consultant, Ad Hoc Web Site Contest, Ad Hoc Competition Study, Ad Hoc Inter-Regional Field Trip, AFMS Scholarship Foundation.

When competitors get in trouble, some of the most common things being: the regional federation did not forward the name of the competitor or any of the information about the class or score of the competitor to the URC Eligibility Files, the URC cannot find the competitors name in any of the regional federations data bases. Make sure the name on the competition form agrees exactly with the name in your federation directory, this is the spelling that will make it onto the trophy or plaque you win. A junior will not be recognized if the directory listing says - husband, wife and family. The juniors name must be listed as a separate name in a juniors club or as an adult along with the junior's father and mothers names. A junior, for competition, will not be recognized by the AFMS when hidden under the heading of "and family".

Urgent Reminder for all Clubs – IRS Filing

All tax-exempt organizations are now required to file either a federal tax return if their income is above a certain level (\$25,000) or file the new Form 990 (the E--Postcard). The law, requiring the e-form filing has been in effect for three years.

A tax-exempt organization that does not file its required annual information Form 990 for three consecutive years will automatically lose its tax-exempt status. The end of 2009 marks the third year that the law has been in effect, and many tax-exempt organizations which failed to file during that period will have their tax-exempt status revoked this year.

Organizations that are expected to lose tax-exempt status this year are small tax-exempt organizations whose annual gross receipts are normally \$25,000 or less, and who in the past were not required to file a Form 990.

An organization that fails to file required e-Postcards Form 990-N (or information returns - Forms 990 or 990-EZ) for 2007 and 2008, it is imperative that they submit Form 990-N for 2009, by May 15, 2010, or revocation may apply.

If an organization loses its exemption, it will have to reapply with the IRS in order to regain its tax-exempt status. Any income received between the revocation date and renewed exemption may be taxable.

Be sure your organization is up to date!!

Recently a short list (below) describing the Obama Administration's potential new national monuments was leaked to the media in late February of this year.

The areas under consideration for new national monument status subject to public support and other considerations include the following lands, Owyhee Canyons, Montana Plains, Otero Mesa, San Rafael Swell, Northern Sonoran Desert, Cascades Siskiyou, Vermillion Basin, Lesser Prairie Chicken, Berrysessa-Snow Mountain, Heart of the Great Basin, Bodie Hills, Modoc Plateau, Cedar Mesa, and San Juan Islands. Approximately 13 million acres of land (possibly more) are at risk for potential designation.

The Proposed National Monuments:

Otero Mesa in New Mexico: A 1.2 million acre grasslands inhabited by prairie dogs, pronghorn, and other wildlife.

San Rafael Swell, Utah: A wild 40x75 mile mix of canyons, gorges, arches, and buttes that includes 5 wilderness study areas.

Owyhee Canyon lands in Oregon and Nevada: The adjacent Idaho portions of this canyon complex was given some partial protection by legislation last year, but Nevada and Oregon sections of this area remain unprotected.

Montana Northern Plains: This would protect the Bitter Creek WSA and other BLM lands which lies just south of the Canadian border and immediately adjacent to Grasslands National Park in Canada. Back in the 1980s.

Northwest Sonoran Desert, Arizona. The Sonoran Desert, dominated by its signature plant, the saguaro cactus, is the most diverse of all North American deserts this proposal would encompass desert lands northwest of Phoenix.

Cascade Siskiyou National Monument expansion,

California/Oregon. In 2000 the Cascades Siskiyou National Monument was established in Oregon, but a portion of the area lies in

California. There is also discussion of including an expanded boundary in Oregon as well to include the proposed Siskiyou Crest to the west of Ashland. The Siskiyou Crest includes portions of the PCT, the Red Buttes Wilderness, and the Kangaroo Road less areas, one of the largest road less areas in northern California.

Vermillion Basin, Colorado. The Vermillion Basin lies along the Colorado-Wyoming border and bisected by Vermillion Creek, a tributary of the Green River. Part of the area was studied by the BLM for wilderness designation. It is another lonely corner of the West with rugged canyons and sage covered slopes containing important sage grouse habitat.

Lesser Prairie Chicken, New Mexico: A 58,000 acre area that is home to bluestem grasslands.

Berrysessa-Snow Mountain, California: This 500,000 acre area would include portions of California's northern Coast Ranges that are the headwaters of Cache Creek, a BLM wilderness area.

Heart of the Great Basin, Nevada: This monument would include the Toiyabe, Monitor, and Toquima Ranges. All three ranges have some protected status granted by wilderness designation.

Bodie Hills, California. If you ever visited Bodie Ghostown State Park north of Mono Lake, than you have been in the **proposed** Bodie Hills National Monument. This is a land of sweeping sage covered hills **Modoc Plateau, California**. The 3 million acre proposed Modoc

Plateau National Monument is another one of those out of the way places in the West where few venture..

Cedar Mesa, Utah. The Cedar Mesa area extends from the San Juan River to Elk Ridge on the north borders Grand Gulch on the west and Comb Wash on the east. It includes some of the best canyons in Utah like Mule, Arch, Fish and others

San Juan Islands, Washington. The 172 islands and islets that make up Washington's San Juan Islands lie in Puget Sound north and west of Seattle.

Other areas on short list:

Among areas on the short list which probably will not get national monument designation at this time are Wyoming's Red Desert, Bristol Bay region and Teshekpuk Lake on the North Slope, both in Alaska.

Land Acquisition and Consolidation

Other parts of the leaked proposal discuss funding for land trades and targeted land acquisition from willing sellers in several important areas to consulate management. For instance, within the Missouri Breaks National Monument there are approximately 80,000acres of private lands which the administration believes could be purchased for approximately \$24 million. Another area targeted for land acquisition is the Upper Green River Valley of Wyoming where almost 400,000 checker boarded state and private acres are located that could be purchased or exchanged. A third area for consolidation is the John Day River in Oregon and the south slope of the Pioneer Mountains in Idaho near Craters of the Moon National Monument.

There is developing in Congress at this moment resistance from some of our western congressional leadership to prevent the government's expansion of removing these lands from the public domain. You can read the drafted letter by following the link.

<u>FYI</u>: Some minor changes have been made to the General Guidelines and to the score sheet for bulletins.

Write Some Sparkle!

There is really no formula for writing great articles, but when we let our personalities shine through our writing we get readable articles that <u>will</u> sparkle. Here are some suggestions for adding pizzazz.

- 1. **Remember your audience**. Are you writing for kids? For all club members? For a specialized group? Adjust sentence length and vocabulary just for them.
- 2. **Vary the length of your sentences**, making some short and some compound. Ask a question to introduce a topic.
- 3. **Keep paragraphs fairly short**. Reading is easier on the eyes if there is a nice amount of "white space" within and around an article.
- 4. **Make your reader laugh** by using humor or irony. It's okay to poke some fun at yourself!
- 5. Use the "active voice" by turning "being verbs" into "doing verbs." Instead of writing Metamorphic rocks were formed from the pressure of our hands on colored pieces of playdough, write: We "made" metamorphic rocks by pressing colored pieces of playdough into a "rock" with our hands.

- 6. Write as if you were talking to a friend about the subject. This makes your article "friendly" and easier to read.
- 7. **Use positives** instead of negatives. Instead of saying *I did not remember*, say *I forgot*. Many times the positive is shorter and easier to understand than the negative.
- 8. **Be specific**. This gives your reader a "mind" picture of what you said.
- 9. **Leave out repetitions** of the same idea and unnecessary words (i.e.: in fact, in other words). A good sentence will get your idea across to the reader in one try. Leaving out unnecessary words keeps the reader from having to hunt for the idea.
- 10. Use a short, attention-getting title. This grabs the reader's attention by making him curious about your subject. You can start with the title or come up with it after you have written your article.

EDIBLE ROCK RECIPES

IGNEOUS ROCKS

1 can evaporated milk (6oz.)

1-1/2 cups sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

½ cup chopped nuts

1-1/4 cups tiny marshmallows

1-1/2 cups chocolate chips

1-teaspoon vanilla

- 1. Grease and 8x8 or 9x9 inch pan.
- 2. Combine evaporated milk with sugar and salt in a saucepan. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, stirring for 5-9 minutes.
- 3. Remove from heat. Add remaining ingredients and stir gently.
- 4. Pour into prepared pan. Let cool. (Refrigerate)
- 5. 1 pan (8x8) makes 30 1-inch squares.

METAMORPHIC ROCKS

½ cup shortening or margarine

1-cup brown sugar

½ teaspoon vanilla

½ cup chopped nuts

½ cup well-drained crushed pineapple

1 egg, beaten

1-cup whole-wheat flour

1-cup flour

1-teaspoon soda

1-teaspoon salt

- 1. Cream the shortening and the sugar.
- 2. Add the beaten egg and vanilla.
- 3. Add the dry ingredients and mix.
- 4. Stir in the fruit and the nuts.
- 5. Drop by teaspoonful onto cookie sheet.
- 6. Bake for 7 minutes at 375* degrees.

Note: Chocolate chips; coconut, wheat germ, etc. can also be added.

SEDIMENTARY ROCKS

Bottom:

1-1/4 cups crushed cereal

1-1/4 tablespoons sugar

½ cup margarine

- 1. Melt the margarine.
- 2. Mix with the cereal and the sugar.
- 3. Press into and 8x8 or 9x9 pan.

Top:

1-cup chocolate or butterscotch chips

1-1/4 cups coconut

1 cup chopped nuts

1 can sweetened condensed milk (14oz.)

- 1. Sprinkle the chips over cereal layer.
- 2. Sprinkle the coconut over chips.
- 3. Sprinkle the nuts over coconut
- 4. Pour condensed milk over the layers.
- 5. Bake for 25 minutes at 325* degrees.
