RV camping is available at the Fairgrounds with electricity and water available for \$10 per night.



Directions to the Mid-Year Meeting in Kennewick, Washington at the **Benton County Fairgrounds on April 16, 2011**

Coming into the Tri-Cities area from the south on Highway 395 turn right (east) onto 10th Ave (the third stop light coming into town). Follow this about 3 miles. The fairgrounds will be visible on the right side just past and behind a park. Once at the Fairgrounds gate you will see the Show building to the right in Building #1. RV camping will be available near that building or in an adjacent area. Walk over to the show to obtain more specific directions for parking. Ask for the RV Camping Coordinator. The Mid Year Meeting will be held in Building #5 which is about 150 yards from Building #1.

From anywhere else coming into Kennewick it would be best to find your way to Highway 395 and take the turn east onto 10th Avenue and then follow it down to the Fairgrounds.

I am also most grateful to these support groups that also have come to my aid in the search for my husband Grant who was reported missing on March 2. What a great support group I belong to.


Missing!!

SO YOU WANT TO EXHIBIT COMPETITIVELY

Dee Holland, NFMS Rules 2011

First off, have you exhibited at your local gem show or fairground gem and mineral section? This is really only a big step above that, and we'll

be with you all the way. We're here to help. YOU are not alone.

Have you competitively exhibited in the past? Had a bad experience and said "never again." We want to calm your fears. Things have changed over these past few years, please try again....and we'll help you as much as we can.

The dreaded RULE BOOK! We've heard it all..... its too big; it's confusing; it's gigantic and imposing! Here's the TRUTH: It's only as big as the Division and class you, your self are interested in. Here's an example:

Division A, and the classes within that division are only three pages, (go to amfed.org; to the download section; the 2011 rules, and its pages 25, 26 and 27.) You also have to download Section I, Part I, General Rules and Definitions, (pages 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12). Now, is that imposing???

Have you ever wondered what Division A – Open, is all about? This might be an area where you would feel most comfortable. It's where you can put in cabs when you don't have enough for the same class in Division C, Lapidary. Or something that doesn't fit elsewhere in any of the other very specialized Divisions. Not enough specimens in the Mineral or Fossil Divisions? Division A gives you a great deal of flexibility and creativity in showing your pieces. If you're looking

for a place to put your exotic gem trees, they have their place in this Division.

Another Division you might consider is Division E, Educational. There are two areas here: A skill or craft, basically a "how to" with a twist, and a Concept – an idea brought forward with a conclusion. (to download this division, it's pages 70, 71, 72 and 73 (along with the same Section I, Part I – so if you've already downloaded this for another division you don't have to do it again – it's the same for all Divisions) There are two audiences you're exhibiting for – general and informed. General is the public, children and adults alike. Informed is for those people who have some knowledge in the subject.

If you have enough material to go into one of the other Divisions, consider these:

Division B – Minerals. This is a huge category including self collected specimens. Browse this if you are a mineral collector. This division covers 17 pages.

Division C – Lapidary. This covers cabochons, carvings, spheres, faceting and all other types of lapidary, polished material. This Division covers 18 pages.

Division D – Jewelry and Art metalcraft. This covers all forms of jewelry including wire-wrapping. Some have stones. This Division covers 7 pages.

Division E – see above

Division F – Fossils. This covers fossils from micro to large. But doesn't include Petrified Wood. This Division has 11 pages.

Division G – Petrified Wood and/or Wood Casts. This has two sections, polished including cabs and bookends, etc. And natural specimens. This Division has 4 pages.

Division H – Scrimshaw. These pieces must be done by hand, not machine. Color or Black. This Division has 2 pages.

Division I – Beading. This includes weaving, stringing, and embroidery. This Division has 5 pages.



ASK NOT WHAT ALAA CAN DO FOR YOU, ASK YOURSELF WHAT YOU CAN DO FOR ALAA...

I hear it all the time..."what's ALAA going to do about the problem?" Here's the problem, YOU ARE ALAA. Simple, if you have a problem it's not ALAA's problem to fix it, YOU have to bring the problem to ALAA, ask for help and then lead the charge to get it fixed. Remember, the other side has had at least 40 years to get their point across. We're just getting out feet wet in the arena of public opinion.

These days rockhounds are getting involved in all areas of the government. Local issues can involve rockhound activities. Be aware that clean water, pollution, dust and other things you might not even equate with rockhounding, gold panning, and metal detecting might be on a local docket. Watch your local newspapers for agenda items to be discussed. Local TV news might alert you to something pending that might be of concern to you as a rockhound. Watch for public notices from government agencies.

Here are some things you can do to prepare yourself:

- Research the problem
 Find out who is responsible for bringing the problem forward.
 Use your computer as a research tool. You'd be surprised
 what you can learn by doing a search on Google, or whatever
 search engine you use.
- Find out why that individual or organization thinks they have a problem.
- Look for solutions, or compromise.
- Be articulate. If you are speaking or writing a letter/report.
- Be concise. Spend some time working your message.

You'll sometimes find help and solutions from outside the rockhound community. There are many other organizations who are working on multiple uses of public lands. Reach out to them and ask if they are having the same problems.... Road closures, new ambiguous regulations, interpretations of the regulations at the management level.

Do you feel strongly enough to bring your concerns to your local City or County Council? Speak before the Forest Service, or speak at a BLM hearing? State Fish and Game, as well as Federal Fish and Game may have an impact on rockhounding... be aware.

Have you even spoken before a body? Terrifying though it may be, YOU CAN DO IT. Know your subject. Be articulate and concise. Have a handout of what your points are and leave it with the group who organized the meeting. Get on their mailing list. Get business cards of important people in the room and ask if you can speak to them personally about the subject at a later date. Look around, look for people with like concerns, don't be afraid to ask for help. YOU don't have to stand alone, bring a group with you. Let them know there are a group of you who care about the issue.

- Never go into a meeting with a chip on your shoulder.
- Be friendly and attentive to what others have to say.

YOU'RE the one who's going to make the difference, ALAA is here to help.

The ground is wet, the diggin's easy, But watch out now or you'll get sneezy. So head out today for the valley or hills, And I hope you find a million thrills.





Public Lands Advisory By Andy Johnson

New Wild Lands Policy Announced

On December 23, 2010, DOI Secretary Ken Salazar and BLM Director, Bob Abbey announced the signing of Secretarial Order 3310. This is new policy affirming BLM's authorities to protect BLM administered lands with wilderness character under the law. It allows designation through the planning process of a new category of protected lands called "Wild Lands."

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 1, 2011 - Today at a Natural Resources Committee hearing, Republican Members soundly rejected the Obama Administration's new "Wild Lands" order. This Secretarial Order, issued without public consultation, attempts to designate Wilderness areas without Congressional approval. Numerous state and local officials testified at today's hearing that this order could lock-up public lands, destroy American jobs, block recreational opportunities and prohibit American energy production.

"This hearing, and the testimony from elected officials today, exposes and begins to address the detrimental impact that the new public lands designation will have on western jobs and livelihoods," said National Parks, Forest and Public Lands Subcommittee Chairman Rob Bishop (UT-01).

"This new policy will significantly impact many existing and planned activities on BLM lands, including mining, grazing, oil and natural gas development, motorized, and other forms of recreation. These restrictions ... will hurt all Americans who enjoy recreational outings on our national lands. This arbitrary order should be rescinded immediately to restore the delicate balance between development and preservation of federal lands that Congress intended when it passed the Federal Land Policy and Management Act," said Energy and Mineral Resources Subcommittee Chairman Doug Lamborn (CO-05).

"Our country already suffers from excessive government regulations. The Administration's Wild Lands order will restrict our economic development by preventing access to valuable public lands and sources of energy, timber and minerals, and will hinder our ability to create jobs in areas with record high unemployment," said Congressman Jeff Denham (CA-19).

"Secretarial Order 3310 promises to make an intolerable situation even worse, by locking up even more BLM land, creating de facto wilderness areas without Congressional action or oversight, and without the support of local communities that will be adversely impacted. This Order will not only prevent consideration of normal forestry, it will eliminate recreational uses such as snowmobiling, trail biking, motorcycling and other motorized access. The elderly and handicapped will be shut out entirely. Order 3310 is elitist and exclusive, rather than inclusive," said Dennis C.W. Smith, Jackson County Commissioner (Oregon).

Wilderness Areas in Owyhee County - Idaho

The Omnibus Public Lands Management Act (P.L. 111-11) designated six Wilderness areas in Owyhee County. Landscapes in these areas range from

river canyons over a thousand feet deep to vast expanses of sagebrush and grassland plateaus that provide habitat for sage-grouse, pronghorn antelope, bighorn sheep, songbirds, raptors, and numerous rare plant species. This high desert, sagebrush steppe habitat was previously underrepresented in the National Wilderness Preservation System.

The river canyons in Owyhee County are the largest concentration of sheer-walled volcanic rhyolite and basalt canyons in the western United States. Some are nearly twice the height of the <u>Washington Monument</u> on the <u>National Mall</u> in Washington DC. River enthusiasts come from around the country to challenge the famous whitewater rapids of these rivers.

The same law that designated the wilderness areas also requires the BLM to complete a travel management plan (TMP) for routes in Owyhee County but outside the wilderness boundaries. Routes that access the wilderness areas and trailheads or other areas of interest in the wilderness areas will be addressed in the TMP. The Owyhee County TMP website has the base maps being used for travel planning and instructions on how to comment during scoping for the TMP. Rock hounds must respond to insure that their outdoor interests and activities are noted and acknowledged by BLM

Washington Department of Fish and Game Officials have temporarily shelved plans to seek increased enforcement authority pertaining to public conduct on lands which the agency controls or manages. Currently the WDFG prohibits the collecting of rocks, minerals; fossils etc on WDFG lands and seek criminal and monetary sanctions against the public for such conduct. The Washington State Mineral Council, ALAA and other organizations and individuals have successfully voice opposition to this plan and requesting that they be placed in the communication loop as stakeholders


