We will leave from the parking lot in front of show entrance at 8 am for all trips.

If you answered yes to any of these questions then the Northwest Federation could use your help. Competitive cases can be fun not only for the visitors to our shows but for the individuals competing. A lot of this depends on if we have Judges, Clerks for the Judges and of course a Rules and Awards Committee consisting of three people. The Registrar, who reviews the application and prepares the scoring sheets. Then transcribes the scores to a Record Card. Safety Report

I just got back from taking my neighbor to his doctor appointment. It reminded me of how much our actions [or lack of action] affect and continue to affect others. Like one domino knocking down the next, an accident usually doesn't affect just one person.

Back in February, my neighbor slipped on the ice and fell – breaking his arm. He now has a metal plate and 6 screws holding his arm together. He and his partner have had to pretty much put their lives on hold for the last 10 weeks while he recuperated. Covid had pretty much shutdown his business and he's not been allowed to drive until his arm heals. His partner works outside the home and has been the sole income. Though that pays most of the bills, they've had to ask for help from the family and neighbors [spreading the effects of the trauma even more.] Hindsight is usually 20/20. This accident is the third time that he has slipped and fallen on the ice in this spot and they are finally putting plans in place to prevent them from falling at this spot again –including using deicer and installing a hand rail.

It only takes a few moments to think about and plan some safety improvements. Money and time constraints may delay some improvements, but there are a few things that can be done now to improve the safety while working in your hobby area. Some of those piles of rocks, boxes, buckets, equipment, cords, rugs, and more can be moved out of the traveled way to prevent tripping on them. Adding hand rails on stairs, additional lighting to improve visibility, and even [gasp] sweeping up debris on the floor and dusting could improve the safety and enjoyment in your work area. Repair or replace eye protection, breathing protection, and hand/ foot protection. It does no good if you use them as decorations on your workbench. Use them for what they are meant for-for keeping you as safe as possible! A few moments to think about safety could prevent a domino effect. Your partner and friends should thank you, but most likely you will be an unsung hero! Thank you HERO!



The good news is that today the doctor has given him permission to drive again. He's now working on putting together his "new normal".

We also need to have clubs step up for the 2022 and 2023 Federation Show. The 2023 show will be combined NFMS/AFMS. Remember, the Federation can help walk you through things. The show can be tagged onto your regular show.

Larry Hulstrom has been helping Brad Larson get the website in current tip-top shape by reviewing content and passing on current information. On this subject, please go to the "Clubs" page and check to see if your information is correct. If not, send the changes to Judi, at nfmssec at gmail.com and she will pass it on. Also, please keep in mind that Judi needs the names of your current directors and contact people. They are the information pipeline to the rest of your club.

We again discussed ideas for using the interest from the Endowment Fund. Part of the fund is currently being used to offset the \$3.50 per adult member dues. Other possible suggestions included using some of the funds to help convert and update the Library's slide programs and assistance to clubs accepting the bid for a Federation Show to help with extraordinary costs.



Resolutions to be Voted on at the Annual Meeting

Proposed addition to the Endowment Fund Operating Procedures



The Endowment Fund Committee proposes to introduce a modification to the Endowment Fund Operating Procedures for approval at the next annual meeting of the Northwest Federation of Mineralogical Societies.

Background. The existing Endowment Fund Committee operating procedures are silent relative to how the committee should deal with an approved spending authorization that is not obligated or committed to a project or program during a specific budget year. For example. The fund spending plan authorizes the expenditure of 4% of the average of the year-end Endowment Fund balances for the previous three years during the budget year. If the requests for Endowment Fund monies do not total the amount authorized to spend that budget year, how should the unused fund authorization be delt with.

The committee looked at two options.

- 1. Cancel the unused authorization and roll it back into the Endowment Fund Balance and start over as if it never existed. This is what we have been doing in recent years.
- 2. Carry the unused authorization over into the next budget year and make it available as an addition to that year's 4% authorization. This could have the effect of increasing the amount of money available in a particular year.

The committee feels option 2 serves the membership of the federation the best and is proposing the following addition to its operating procedures.

Add the following to OP COMMITTEE -3, ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE, Fund Management--Spending Policy section.

Add the following:

E. Any unobligated portion of an annual authorization will be rolled over to the following budget year and will be treated as an addition to the authorization for that year.

This may create a slight increase in record keeping work for the committee.

The Endowment Fund Committee urges the various NFMS societies to discuss this and be prepared to vote on the change at the next annual meeting.

Proposed By-Law Change to Reflect Ability to Conduct Official Business via Electronic Means When Essential **Rationale:**

The events for the past year (i.e., Pandemic) have brought to light the need to conduct official business by electronic means under certain unforeseen emergency conditions. An Emergency Proclamation by the Governor of Washington State (where the Northwest Federation of Mineralogical Societies is incorporated) allowed for such to occur for the October 17, 2020 Annual NFMS Business Meeting regardless of our current By-Laws.

Since unforeseen circumstances could again provide the necessity for a repeat occurrence, and because of the efficiency, effectiveness and cost saving factors of widely available electronic meeting procedures, this Resolution to amend the current NFMS By-Laws is submitted.

Current By-laws: Read ARTICLE VIII Parts A, B, C, D, E, F

Proposal: Correct spelling errors and wording in Parts A-F as indicated in Bold Underline.

Create Part G to address Electronic Meetings. (In Bold)

Add Part G to Table of Contents under ARTICLE VIII

ARTICLE VIII

Meetings

Part A. Annual Meeting

Section 1. The Annual Meeting of the Assembly of Directors and Delegates of the Federation shall be at a time chosen by the host society whose bid for the convention and show has been accepted by a majority vote of the Assembly of Directors. The date of the Convention and Show shall have no effect on the fiscal or the operations year of the Federation.

Section 2. The Member Society Directors and Delegates present at any Annual Meeting shall constitute a quorum for conducting business. Section 3. Each Member Society may be represented at the Annual Meeting by two (2) delegates who are members of the Society they representer the resenter the term of the society they representer the term of the society they representer the term of the society they represented the term of the society they represented the term of the society they represented the term of the society term of term of the society term of term of

Section 4. Before being seated at any Annual Meeting, all Delegates shall be required to file with the Credentials Committe<u>e</u>; <u>a</u>uthorization<u>s</u> being signed by the president and Secretary of their representative societies.

Section 5. No delegate may represent more than one Member Society.

Section 6. No Proxy votes will be accepted.

Section 7. All business of the NFMS shall be transacted at the Annual Meeting, except such business as may be specifically assigned to the Assembly of Directors or the Executive Board.

Part B. Special Meeting

Section 1. A post-Convention meeting of the Assembly of Directors may be called by the newly elected President following the Annual meeting, at which time they shall transact any business assigned to them by the Delegates at the Annual meeting.

Section 2. Special meetings may be called by the President for the purpose of transacting any business within the authority of the Assembly of Directors.

Section 3. The President, or any seven (7) Member Societies may call a special meeting of the Assembly of Directors for an emergency. Section 4. One third (1/3) of the membership of the Assembly of Directors shall constitute a quorum when the **special** meeting is assembled. A majority of the membership of the Assembly of Directors shall constitute a quorum when meeting by mail or electronic means.

Part C. Mid-Year Meeting

If needed for the purpose of informing and discussing with the directors of the Member Societies impending business, committee progress reports, and other pertinent business to be acted upon at the next Annual Meeting; one (1) NFMS Directors <u>Mid</u>-Year Meeting may be held annually at a centralized location. The date of this meeting is to be set by the NFMS Executive Board.

Part D. Organizational Meeting

To be held, whenever possible, in the fall of the year at a date and place designated by the newly elected President, for the purpose of organizing the new Executive Board; also for resolving any old unfinished business including any known AFMS considerations.

Part E. Rules of Order

<u>R</u>obert's Rules of Order, Revised, unless otherwise provided for in these By-Laws, shall govern all meetings of this Federation and its Assembly of Directors.

Part F. Parliamentarian

The Parliamentarian shall not be a Delegate or Director of any Member Society.

Part G. Electronic Meetings

All meetings specified by this Bylaw Article VIII, Parts A, B, C & D shall be conducted with Officers, appropriately credentialed Directors and delegates present in person if possible. However, in case of Emergency declared by Governmental authorities, such as a Public Health Crisis, Natural Disaster, Civil Unrest, or other Disaster, the Executive Board is authorized to conduct such meetings by electronic means. The provisions of Robert's Rules of Order, 12th (or later) Revision, Appendix "SAMPLE RULES FOR ELECTRONIC MEETINGS' pp.635-649 shall apply with special regard to conduct of the meeting, and voting by show of hands or secret ballot as appropriate. The specific Internet protocol and program used to hold such a meeting shall be left to the discretion of the Executive Board.

Furthermore, informal meetings such as those of Committees, Executive Board, or other working bodies of the NFMS may also be similarly held by electronic means at any time when requested by the Chairperson.
