Utah Dinosaur Sites

Utah is renowned for their bounty of dinosaur fossils. Many venues exist where you can experience where dinosaurs once lived and where their remains still exist. In fact, there are so many that I'm only giving you an overview here. More research can be done on the Internet by searching "Utah dinosaurs."

Southeastern Utah has many dinosaur track sights and two terrific museums/parks at Moab! The Dinosaur Museum at Blanding is now open for the year and offers many spectacular rare skeletons and fossils from the 4 Corners area! Dinosaur eggs, fossilized trees, and dinosaur skin is on display there.

In eastern Utah, you should know that the Quarry at Dinosaur National Monument is closed until further notice while repairs are made on the building structure. The quarry is the only place in the monument where the public can easily see dinosaur fossils embedded in rock. However, trails and tours and activities are still going on around the area

At the Utah Field House of Natural History State Park Museum in Vernal, visitors stroll through time--historic, prehistoric and geologic. Exhibits of rock types and vertebrate and invertebrate fossils fill the Geology Hall. Outside in the Dinosaur Garden, Mesozoic creatures dominate. A small lake and waterfall tumbling across native rock with foliage reminiscent of the Mesozoic era enhance the illusion. Park admission is \$1.50 for adults, and \$1.00 for children ages 6-15. Hours are 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. during summer months, and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. the rest of the year, 435-789-3799. For more information on these attractions, call 800-477-5558.

The College of Eastern Utah (CEU) Prehistoric Museum in Price showcases the areas' ancient past, when dinosaurs roamed here. They left behind their bones, footprints and other traces of their existence. The museum has many complete skeletons from the Jurassic and Cretaceous periods. The collection also contains many dinosaur tracks removed from local coal mines, dinosaur eggs, and other fossils. The CEU Prehistoric Museum currently operates multiple active dinosaur fossil quarries. The discovery of the remains of "Utahraptor" by museum personnel has put the museum on the cutting edge of scientific discovery. The CEU Museum is open daily 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. from April through September, and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., October through March. 435-637-5060. Please call or visit the website http://museum.ceu.edu for admission rates and other information.

Cleveland-Lloyd Dinosaur Quarry is one of the most prolific fossil sites in the world. It is located on the northern rim of Utah's San Rafael Swell, 35 miles south of Price, and was discovered in the early 1900's by area ranchers; it is the only quarry of its kind in the world. It was formed in the Jurassic Period, about 147 million years ago. Since 1928, over 12,000 bones have been removed from the quarry. The preponderance of Allosaurus bones almost single-handedly ensured Allosaurus' selection as the Utah State Fossil. The site has also yielded many Jurassic plant eaters like Stegosaurus and other meat-eating dinosaurs unique to this quarry. The quarry is open daily during the summer and on a reduced schedule during spring and fall. A small user fee is charged.

The Museum of the San Rafael in Castle Dale tells the stories of a primitive past long buried under shifting soils. A replica of a fossilized dinosaur egg believed to contain an embryo is part of the collection, as well as skeletons of Allosaurus, Chasmosaurus, Albertosaurus, and the great skull of Tyrannosaurus Rex. The museum is open Mon - Fri. 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and donations are requested, 96 N. 100 E., Castle Dale, 435-381-5252. For more information on these attractions, call 800-842-0789.

In Northern Utah, a whole vacation can be had without leaving the Ogden area! George S. Eccles Dinosaur Park (dinosaurpark.org), and Ogden's Weber State University Museum of Natural History are located there. Provo's Brigham Young University's Earth Science Museum and Thanksgiving Point's world's largest dinosaur museum are all close by, too. There are incredible dinosaur finds to see at each place.

In fact, this year at the 68th Annual Meeting June 20-22 in Ontario, Oregon, the George S Eccles Dinosaur Park plans to bring their collection of dinosaur eggs to Ontario and display them. For me (in Boise, Idaho) that's closer than a drive to Ogden! And I love dinosaurs!

The Rocks in a Box Challenge

The **Panorama Gem and Mineral Club** of Kettle Falls, Washington is ready. We have our rocks together! Well alright, not all of our rocks, but a pretty good sample. Our collection includes crystals, metals, fossils, opal, real gold and more. Many of our samples are fluorescent under UV light. All of them are good examples of what you can expect to find in our area, Northeast Washington.

Our collection comes with its own guide book, a collection of stories with maps and GPS positions for the rocks in this box. The box itself is a fairly standard storage box for tied flies that we bought at WALMART. It is 11" x 7" x 1.75" and has 18 compartments.

So the challenge is: "We want to trade these boxes for similar collections of sample rocks that other clubs find on their field trips." It would be ideal if other clubs could provide a guide such as ours. But, we will settle for a key to what is in the collection that includes the name of the mineral, a location where it can be found, (GPS coordinates if possible), chemical formulas where important, notes about its properties, value, abundance, and kudos to those who contributed samples. We can supply boxes if helpful.

Through this exchange we hope to build a collection of collections. It will be exciting to see what other clubs are finding, and especially nice in this era of high fuel costs to not be burning too much gas in the process. Of course this kind of thing inevitably leads to field trips, visits, contests, displays at rock shows, etc. So, we can't promise that this idea will stop global warming. We can promise that it will be fun.
