AFMS Show Report By Hidemi Kira

In this issue, I would like to write a short report regarding the AFMS (American Federation of Mineralogical Societies) meeting. I was given an opportunity to attend the AFMS 67th Annual Meeting & Show held in Tulsa, Oklahoma in July because our 1st VP Warren Rood could not make it to the meeting (President and the 1st VP of the each Federation are supposed to attend the meeting). First of all, for the newer members, I would like to briefly write about the AFMS. There are 7 regional Federations under the AFMS: California Federation (CMFS: 8,657 members), Eastern Federation (EFMLS: 8,948 members), Midwest Federation (MWF: 7,618 members), Rocky Mountain Federation (RMFMS: 7,096 members), South Central Federation (SCFMS: 3,244 members), Southeast Federation (SFMS: 5,402 members) and the Northwest Federation (NFMS: 6,031 members) where we belong. The numbers next to the each Federation are the membership as of 2014 and the total is 46,996. Officers are President, President-Elect, 1st Regional VP, 2nd Regional VP, 3rd Regional VP, 5th Regional VP, Secretary and Treasurer. Jon Spunaugle of our NFMS was nominated for 3rd Regional VP in Tulsa.

There are many committees as well and you can check out the AFMS online at <u>www.amfed.org</u> for details. A club that belongs to the each federation hosts the AFMS Meeting and Show every 7 years. The next will be in Austin, TX in 2015 hosted by South Central Federation and the NFMS will be hosting in Albany, OR in 2016 by the Willamette Agate & Mineral Society (Salem Club).

The AFMS may look something not so close to you, but if your club belongs to the Federation that means you are a member of the AFMS as well. So please check out what the AFMS is doing by going to the site mentioned above.

The AFMS Meeting and Show in July was hosted by the Tulsa Rock & Mineral Society of the Rocky Mountain Federation and it was combined with the RMFMS and the Club's Meeting and Show. I would like to thank the Tulsa Club for doing an excellent job. The meetings and the show were very well coordinated and I had a wonderful and enjoyable time. The AFMS Annual Meeting was held on July 10 at the Hilton Garden Inn one day before the 3 day show started. I am sure there will be reports on the AFMS newsletter, so please check out the site above.

The Annual Meeting was well attended and majority of the reports were included in the packet made prior to the meeting which helps keep the business meeting short. The Show was on July 11 to 13th at the Tulsa State Fairgrounds. There were many display cases including 35 competitive cases and many of them were minerals. I heard the judges worked pretty hard and long to judge all the cases. I brought my Oregon material case to show what Oregon rocks look like and surprised that my 4'W, 2'H, 2'D case that I thought was a "Standard Federation Case" was called an "ODD SIZE CASE". A majority of the cases were not as wide and fairly small (I found out later that my case size is a Federation Standard case but some Federations have their own sizes).

There were 28 dealers, Silent Auction, Demonstrations, Fluorescent Displays, Children's area, Touch and Feel rocks, Oklahoma Geological Survey booth and others. The material I saw among the dealers, displays, and auction materials were mostly minerals or fossils, but it was very enjoyable even though I am more into cutting and polishing, loving plumes, sagenites and etc.

Here are some of the figures I got later. There were 171 people attending the Award Banquet, over 100 at the Editor's breakfast and over 90 at the luncheon. The Banquet had Native American dancers and ended around 11:30 pm. There was lots of fun and excitement going around. This was a good opportunity for me to learn what the AFMS is about and a great opportunity to meet the people who are involved in the AFMS.

In the next issue, I may write about the rock collecting part on the way home from Oklahoma.

AFMS Scholarship Honorees Lyle and Audrey Vogelpohl

We are very honored at being selected the Scholarship Honorees from the Northwest Federation. What it meant was we were able to help two graduate students in the Earth Science Geology Field with \$4,000 scholarship grants EACH from the American Federation Scholarship Foundation to help in their work towards a Master's or Doctor's degree. We contacted Central Washington and Western Washington Universities, asking for recommendations in selecting qualified students, following the AFMS Scholarship Foundation requirements. We asked specifically for students that were in the Geology Program. Their recommendations of students covered academics and outside activities in their fields of interest. All were

highly qualified. So we decided to ask each candidate "reflecting on your thesis, where do you see yourself in the year 2019?" Their answers made our choices much easier.

Hal Wershow, graduate of Western Washington University will be sharing his passion and knowledge of the geology of the North Cascades as high school Earth Science teacher, or a community college professor, or perhaps a National Park Service interpretive ranger wanting to develop knowledgeable geology enthusiasts who understand the dynamic nature of the land.

Kevin DeLano, graduate of Central Washington University, replied that in 2019 "I will wake up from a restless sleep, wash down breakfast with Tang, and gear up for another day in the field." His goal is to work as an engineering geologist and then become a NASA astronaut, so when NASA is ready to return to the Moon, he will be there to conduct geologic research on the lunar surface. Kevin has already interned with the NASA Planetary Geology Undergraduate Research Program. He wants to get the average American interested and excited about science focusing on geology.

A Dozen Great Reasons to Attend the (Next) NFMS Show & Convention

I enjoy going to local rock and fossil shows and helping with my club's yearly show in Tenino, Washington. As a life-long rockhound, I really look forward to going to the NFMS show. The following are a dozen of my favorite reasons for attending the NFMS show & convention.

<u>1. Access to Great Vendors</u>. The NFMS show attracts high quality mineral, fossil, gem, lapidary, and equipment vendors from around the western United States. The vendors provide an opportunity to examine and buy useful tools and equipment. You also can purchase specimens for lapidary purposes, such as, making cabochons, jewelry, or other neat uses. Similarly you can purchase specimens for your collection. Many of the specimens that the vendors bring are from far away locations in the United States and around the globe.

<u>2. Awesome Displays</u>. Individuals and clubs will display minerals, fossils, gems, rocks, and lapidary cases. Many of these cases include fabulous specimens. Often times you will see museum quality displays. Some of my favorites are the educational displays, which you can learn a great deal from, and the amazing intarsia and cabochon displays.

<u>3. Enter a Display Case</u>. The NFMS show is an opportunity to enter a display case. Although it involves some effort and planning, entering a display case is a great way to show off your collection in a fun and artsy way. There are dozens of categories in which to compete. Your case then will be judged and you have a chance to win a ribbon or plaque.

<u>4. Guest Speakers</u>. The NFMS show usually includes some interesting presentations. Many of these speakers are leading experts in their profession. I've heard very interesting presentations on everything from meteorites to dinosaur evolution to ice age floods to rockhounding law. The presentations often include specimens or slides that bring the subject matter to life.

5. Kids Activities. The NFMS show always has fun activities designed specifically for children. These activities include everything from mineral bingo to rock identification to a simple spin-a-wheel. In addition, usually there also are demonstrations for kids, such as learning how to make a cabochon or a gem tree.

<u>6. Silent Auction</u>. The silent auction provides a fun opportunity for bidders to stalk their prey with a constantly changing table of rocks. Silent auctions are exciting for people of all ages.

7. Meet Experts. The NFMS convention attracts a variety of experts. It is very cool to meet experts in their respective fields as well as people who have learned a great deal about different aspects of rockhounding. For example, I've seen experts on mineral and gem identification, which can help if you want to know if your treasure really is a valuable gem. I've also met a guy who could identify a great number of types of petrified wood.

8. <u>Raffles</u>. The raffles are very fun. They are even more fun if you are lucky. If you arrive early and spend the whole day at the show your odds of winning a terrific prize go up, as often times you must be present to win and they will keep drawing tickets until they get a winner.

<u>9. Live Auction</u>. The live auction is an excellent opportunity to buy fabulous specimens at a fraction of the price that it might cost you to go on an expedition to go try to collect similar specimens. The auction often includes specimens from all over the world. Besides, the money you pay goes to a great cause.

<u>10. Lapidary Experts</u>. Another great feature of the NFMS convention is that it includes some lapidary experts who are generous with their time and talent. I've seen and participated in demonstrations on cabbing and faceting, as well as fish fossil cleaning, sphere making, and gem tree crafting. You can learn a lot from these experts, as they help teach you how to create fascinating treasures.

<u>11. Awards Dinner</u>. The awards dinner is a great chance to meet more interesting people and to see the officers who do a lot of the behind the scenes work for the NFMS. This also is where all the awards from the year are given. In addition, there is a short live auction for gems where the money goes to the AFMS scholarship program.

<u>12. Meet Other Rockhounds</u>. Finally the best reason to attend the NFMS convention is the other rockhounds. It is fun to meet other rockhounds, because they have very interesting and entertaining stories, as well as the fact that they share a passion for this unique hobby. Some may even become field trip buddies or someone to trade specimens with.

In sum, rock shows are a lot of fun. The annual NFMS show, however, is a terrific experience. Plan to attend. I hope I will see you there.

The NFMS appreciates your help in trying to trim costs. Besides not needing to increase dues to the clubs some of the savings will be used to help clubs with speakers, field trips, and displays.
