



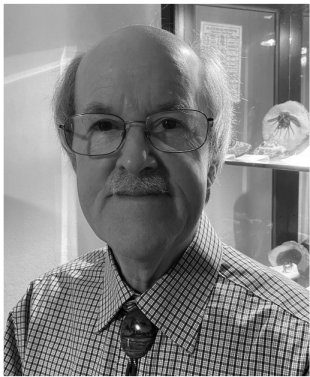

If you see an error once your show is listed, or if your show is not listed, contact the Newsletter Chair.

Hello and Greetings from Montana



As the candidate for Second Vice President of the Northwest Federation of Mineralogical Societies, I thought I would take this opportunity to introduce myself. Going back more years than I care to admit, I graduated from Purdue University in my home state of Indiana with a BS in Natural and Cultural Education. And while they may not at first seem related, I also graduated from St. Francis University with a BS in Art.

I spent my early career as a park ranger for the National Park Service in natural and cultural education and retired as the Chief of Resource Management at a little-known National Memorial, Arkansas Post. From the Blue Ridge Parkway to Craters of the Moon National Monument, I worked at 7 different locations. The geological parks were my favorite; the swamps like Big Thicket National Preserve, fell much lower on my list. As a ranger with both an art and an education degree, I was often tasked with writing and illustrating trail guides, park newspapers, and teacher resources.

During my time in North Carolina, I met and married a fellow law enforcement ranger who ultimately went back to school to pursue a second career as a Doctor of Optometry. 

George Last, Geology Research Coordinator and Adjunct Faculty at WSU Tri-Cities, and the AFMS Scholarship Foundation Honoree for 2022, will be the **guest speaker at the annual NFMS banquet to be held on Saturday October 1**. The banquet will be held in one of the rooms of the Wingspan Event Center (801 NE 34th Ave) in Hillsboro OR, in conjunction with the Portland Regional Gem and Mineral Show Association annual show that weekend. (Doors open at 6:00 pm with dinner buffet served at 6:30 pm). George will present some of the latest geologic research at the **Coyote Canyon Mammoth Site**, which is located on private land south of Kennewick, Washington. Formal excavation and scientific study have been ongoing since the Fall of 2010. Thus far, more than 152 mammoth bone specimens have been recovered from the site, with several others still in place. These skeletal elements are located in fine-grained Late Pleistocene Missoula flood deposits in a distal canyon of the former glacial Lake Lewis.
