**Heat Stress**






# **Kid's Corner**

The Willamette Agate Mineral Society in Salem, Oregon has had a pretty cool few months! Here are some things they have been doing!

WAMS Juniors have spent the months of June and July with an emphasis on the Fossils badge during their meetings (making casts and molds, tril-o-bite cookies) understanding how fossils are formed and a pretty good background on what is known of trilobites.

Also in June, 14 WAMS Juniors took a fieldtrip to Newport on the Oregon Coast, where they had the opportunity to meet with Kent Gibson, a nationally known fossil collector who has some of his incredible specimens on display in the Smithsonian Institution and other museums. With thousands of fossils that he has collected on display in his lab, workshop and at his home, Mr. Gibson led the Juniors in discussions on how to prepare and preserve fossils as well as where to find them nearby. In addition, each Junior was given a fossil vertebrae at the end of the discussion.



Also in June, a number of WAMS Juniors families traveled to Central Oregon for the Prineville Rock and Gem Show Pow-Wow. While there, some traveled to the John Day Fossil Beds National Monument (currently celebrating it's 50th anniversary), and some of the Juniors even dug fossilized plants (to include the Oregon State Fossil—the metasequoia) in the town of — you guessed it—Fossil, Oregon. —Brian Leavitt

### **Rock Of The Month: Cerussite**

Cerussite, a lead carbonate mineral (PbCO<sub>3</sub>), is admired by collectors for its brilliant luster and striking crystal forms. Known for its high dispersion, cerussite can sparkle with flashes of color similar to a diamond, especially in its clear, well-formed specimens. It often appears in twinned or reticulated "snowflake" patterns, which are particularly prized. Cerussite commonly forms in the oxidation zones of lead ore deposits and is often found in association with galena and anglesite. Famous localities that produce world-class specimens include Tsumeb, Namibia; Broken Hill, Australia; and Morocco.

Historically, cerussite played a significant role as an important ore of lead, mined for use in pipes, paints, and other applications. Its name comes from the Latin cerussa, meaning "white lead," reflecting its historical use as a pigment in paints and cosmetics. Although toxic and unsuitable for modern consumer uses, cerussite was once a common material in white pigments throughout Europe. While industrial demand has declined, its dazzling crystals and unusual growth habits have made cerussite a favorite among mineral enthusiasts worldwide.

For collectors, cerussite presents both rewards and challenges. Its delicate nature, brittleness, and high density make it fragile to handle and difficult to display safely, yet its visual appeal makes it irresistible. Reticulated "snowflake" twins and gemmy, transparent crystals are especially sought after, often fetching high prices in the mineral market. Whether valued for its historical importance or its breathtaking beauty, cerussite remains a standout mineral that exemplifies the artistry of nature.

Endowment Fund Committee Report Vicki Johnson, Chairperson

The NFMS Endowment Fund committee activities were put on hold after the mid-year meeting while we waited to see how the current political situation was going to affect our fund cash balance. As a result, no projects were funded during the past year. We did, however, continue to search for potential projects to fund in the future. In addition to the project we shared at the mid-year meeting, we have identified a few more that will be evaluated for their benefit to the membership of the federation or the public.

In addition, we have also been working with the NFMS Executive Committee to see where Endowment Fund monies might be used to increase the participation of federation members in the various federation activities. We have been discussing ways to increase club director/delegate attendance at annual meetings and ways to increase participation in various federation competitions such as Rockhound of the Year, Web site competition, Competitive case competition, Club Newsletter competitions, etc. Attachment 1 for a current listing of potential projects or programs.

We have asked for a block of time at the annual meeting to get a feeling of the level of support for the projects being considered.

For additional information here are constraints on how we can spend Endowment Fund money.

Our Endowment Fund spending policy limits expenditure to a little over \$10,000 this coming year.

- As a 501 c (3) not for profit organization we have an obligation to spend some of our monies on programs and/or projects that benefit the general public.
- Funded projects and programs must provide benefit to a majority of the

- membership of the federation or to the general public.
- We cannot give outright grants to organizations, projects or programs outside the federation without receiving a clear benefit to our membership.
- Allocated funds must be spent and projects completed within the budget year they are allocated.

We now have a pretty good picture of how much money we will have to spend this next year and hope to be able to recommend to the NFMS Executive Committee by January 1, 2026 which projects or programs best meet our funding criteria. Between now and then we will need to identify the specific projects, who will take the lead in making them happen, how much to allocate, and when it will be finished.

As you can see from the financial report submitted by our financial advisor, Jim Brain, Attachment 2, that our account balance has shown only a slight gain the past year. Expectations are that this will not change significantly in the near future. Finally, the committee is still looking for a person to take over as the committee treasurer position and another to work with our financial advisor as he would like to also step down in another year or so.

#### Potential Projects that could be funded from NFMS Endowment Fund Monies

(Not in any particular order of priority)

- Prepare a traveling exhibit or two that could be used at the annual meetings, club shows or other events highlighting the various rocks and minerals found across the federation.
- Develop a series of 30 minute "Rock Talk" presentations building on existing material available thru the AFMS Juniors website to be available to clubs within the federation for use when asked to make presentations to outside organizations like library programs, scouting groups, 4H clubs, etc.
- Contract to produce a YouTube type video promoting the rock hounding hobby for showing at the annual meeting or other outside events.

- Pay travel/speaker fees for individuals invited to make presentations at the annual meeting.
- Make a grant to the Peterson's Rock Garden and Peacock sanctuary to assist in restoring the rock displays.
- Reimburse clubs hosting the Annual Meeting for extra ordinary expenses incurred because of the meeting.
- Encourage more participation at annual meeting events like the banquet by paying the dinner cost for a director from each club in attendance.
- Support not for profit museums across the federation that offer significant gem and mineral displays by making donations in exchange for free admission for NFMS members.
- Resume the effort to upgrade the Slide and Video library material to be compatible with modern technologies.
- Fund the purchase of trophies or other items to be awarded for participation in federation activities.
- Provide cash awards for NFMS competitions such as Web site, Newsletter, All American club, display cases, etc. awards.
- 12. Reinstate the \$1.00 reduction in adult membership dues and offset the difference with funds from the endowment fund.
- 13. Allocate monies to assist in paying travel expenses to the annual meeting for NFMS committee chairpersons and others asked to participate in the meeting.
- 14. Provide a blanket liability insurance coverage covering all activities of the federation and its member society including shows, field trips and other events.

• In accordance with Article XIV Amendments. Section 1. All Amendments to these Bylaws and all resolutions must be sponsored by a member Society in good standing: The Bitterroot Gem and Mineral Society has agreed to support these amendments. We hereby request that this be approved by the Executive Board and forwarded to the Resolutions Committee. Upon approval or lack of action within 30 days of receipt by the Resolutions Committee this will be placed on the Agenda

- for both the 2025 Mid Year and Annual Meetings.
- Correction of numerous clerical errors Including capitalizations, punctuation, etc. These clerical errors are not enumerated. There is no requirement for an amendment to correct them.
- Various changes were made to correct the format and numbering.
- Some language that belonged in Government were moved from Meetings.
- Many sentences were simplified by removing duplicate and unnecessary wording without changing the intent or purpose.
- The word By-Laws be replaced throughout with the word Bylaws.
- Article I. Original text is deleted due to duplication from the Articles of Incorporation
- In reference to Article IV Fiscal Year. It was discussed with a majority agreement at the 2024 Annual Meeting in Hermiston Oregon, May 2024 that the fiscal year should be changed to align with IRS and banking years that begin and end with the calendar year. The requested change is as follows:
- Remove September 1<sup>st</sup> through 31 August replace with "January 1 through December 31<sup>st</sup> of each calendar year"." And concerning closing and auditing of books remove August 31st and replace with December 31<sup>st</sup>.
- This Fiscal Year change necessitates another change of the Bylaws as follows: In Article VII, Part E. Election of Officers, Section 4. Replace Labor Day with January 1<sup>st</sup>
- Article VII Government: Part C. Added in order to clearly define this entity of the Government of the NFMS. Part D. Added in order to define the Assembly of Directors. Part E. Section 1. Add Utah.
- Article VIII Meetings This section has been rewritten to clarify the Meetings, which entities attend, vote, quorums. Much of this was extracted from the existing Bylaws with some additions to make this section more understandable and align with how the business of the NFMS is (has been) conducted.

- Article IX, Duties of Officers, Section 4. ALL FEDERATION OFFICERS:
- Remove the words "the fall" from "and the fall Organizational Meeting", (this meeting no longer is held exclusively in the fall)
- Article X Section 2. a. the Circulation Committee is deleted as it is no longer necessary. Section 2 b. A portion of this section is to be moved to the Ops.
- Article XV named Historical Information.

#### NFMS ENDOMWNT FUND FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE 2024-25 ANNUAL MEETING

To: Endowment Fund Committee Members and NFMS Executive Board

Subject: Abbreviated year to date NFMS Endowment Fund Financial Report

This is a special report describing the NFMS Endowment Fund financial status. It covers the first 11 months of the organization's business year but gives a pretty good picture of where we stand.

It is an understatement to say we have been on a roller coaster ride this year. Our portfolio month end balance has fluctuated up or down by as much as \$7,000 a month. As of July 31, 2025 we happen to be on a upswing and currently have assets on deposit with Charles Schwab Investment totaling \$310,562.85 which reflects a modest gain of \$14,658.84 or 4.95% so far this business year. If there is any good news, the monthly swings have leveled off but the market has not shown many signs of resuming growth. We will have to wait and see what the next few months look like.

Our funds are split between the Operating Account (\$22,439.43) and the Managed Investment Account (\$288,128.40). The Operating Account balance has had a slight gain of \$126.31 donations and interest over the last 11 months while the Managed Investment Account has had a modest gain of \$14.532.53 from stock dividends and interest receipts plus value appreciation over the same period.

#### What is on the horizon:

As I mentioned in my mid-year report we were going to pause expenditure until we got a better picture of the future of the stock market. The impacts of inflation and tariffs are now starting to be reflected in the market though we will continue the spending pause until the start of the next calendar year when we should have a better picture of the future.

On or about September 10<sup>th</sup> I should have the September statement from Charles Schwab and will be able to prepare the detailed final year end status report for the Endowment Fund as well as have the information needed for filing the federal tax return.

The Endowment Fund Committee will continue to evaluate potential spending opportunities and be ready to move forward with normal business after January 1,2026.

In the mean time, I encourage member societies and individuals to consider making donations to your NFMS Endowment fund. Every little dollar helps us keep up with the affects of inflation.
