American Federation of Mineral Societies Contest Information

It's Never Too Early

If you have been reading the Newsletters, you have noticed bits of information about deadlines for contests being earlier this year because of the fact the American Federation Show will be March 27-30, 2025. In order for the individual Federations to have time for judging entries from various contests and such before submitting the top individuals to the American Federation, the deadlines for events is earlier this year. We want everyone to be prepared and ready to take part in the opportunities, so I am attempting to create a comprehensive collection of due dates for the various submissions. If you or your club have not entered into any of these opportunities, now is the time. It doesn't have to be a club President or Director that tells everyone about the different opportunities. If you see something you think is of interest step forward and ask for more information, if needed, or enlist some more of your club members to be a part of something.

All American Contest- this is best as a group effort. Enlist some creative members of your club and create a yearbook that details the great activities your club takes part in. The completed book can be used as a public relations tool. All of the information on how to go about this process and a booklet outlining suggestions can be found on the AFMS website. The dates are incorrect, but the information is relevant. You can reach out to Mary Boesdorfer, writteninwood at gmail.com for guidance and all the details. New Programs-This can also be a group effort, or it can be done by an individual. There is also a section for Juniors and professionals. "Competition encourages individuals and clubs to put together a program that any club could use as a program. Put it into electronic form, then enter that program into the annual AFMS competition. Deadline for 2024 entries will be January 15, 2025. If your regional Federation has a New Programs Competition chair, you need to send it to that person, and they should forward it to me. If not, you may send it directly to me with a note that your Federation does not have a competition, and I will enter it as a Direct Entry. DeLane Cox, New Programs Competition Chair, at delanec3-at-earthlink.net . If you are needing information quickly, you may call at 479-254-0894. I will get back to you as soon as possible. Bulletin Aids Contest- If you see this written somewhere and think, "This doesn't pertain to me.", maybe you are wrong. Are you even sure you know what it is all about? This is a contest relevant to your newsletter or other publications your club may have produced. Perhaps a member wrote about a field trip. The presentations at the AFMS Show in March 2025 will be for work completed in 2024. The deadline for submitting work to Priscilla will most probably be near the beginning of January, so now is the time to be getting ready to submit. Juniors Contests- Juniors have many opportunities to win awards, including monetary awards. The FRA Program has added extra incentives and badges. Juniors can now submit their written work or drawings to the Newsletter "Crack the News" and earn a "George the Geode" patch. There is a Junior Achievement Award that may bring a monetary award with it. There is a special award for a Junior who had entered a competitive case. The Lilian Turner Award is exclusively for a Junior rockhound. You can learn much more about these things on the NFMS website or the Junior website www.juniors.amfed.org. Endowment Fund Committee Needs Your Input Submitted by: Jim Brain, Endowment Fund Financial Advisor

For years our federation leadership has been asked many times loud and clear by member societies and by individual members, "What does the Federation do for us?". Now is your chance to help answer that question.

As a little background, over the past few years spending from the Endowment Fund has been limited to covering the reduced federation income created when the membership voted to reduce membership dues by \$1.00 per adult member. That decision plus the effects that the Covid 19 pandemic had on overall federation membership and rising inflation has required the NFMS Executive Committee to lean heavily on the Endowment Fund to fund the basic operation of the federation. As of the end of September the federation's financial situation has improved significantly. The need to make up for revenue shortfalls has subsided. Currently the Endowment Fund has a balance of nearly \$300,000. Annually we are authorized to spend 4% of the average of the previous three yearend fund balances plus any carryover funds unexpended from the previous year. This results in about \$14,000 being available this current NFMS business year.

The committee would like to allocate the funds by February 1, 2025. We are now seeking suggestions from the member societies and operating committees as to how best to utilize monies from the Endowment Fund. To meet that timeline, we are asking each society, at one of their upcoming meetings, to discuss possible ways to spend the Endowment Fund monies. Keep in mind funds must be used on programs or activities that benefit the general membership of NFMS.

Several years ago, Endowment Funds were used to upgrade equipment at Camp Hancock and helped fund a permanent exhibit at Montana Tech. (Camp Hancock is now a self-supporting activity and Fund monies can no longer be used to support activities outside the federation.)

Endowment Fund monies can only be used to cover NFMS basic operating costs in emergency situations to make up for revenue shortfalls like those that occurred in the recent past when member dues were reduced.

Over the years endowment funds have funded travel costs for outside speakers at annual meetings, funded special traveling exhibits at annual shows, and paid for the additional costs incurred by the hosting clubs to accommodate the annual meeting.

Currently on the table is a project to accelerate the updating of the material in the Slide/Video library to modern technologies. We are awaiting cost estimates for that.

Using the format below please include a brief description of your proposals, an estimated cost, and state how it would benefit the NFMS membership as a whole. Jim Brain, Endowment Fund Financial Advisor, will be consolidating the responses for the committee. He needs your response by January 1, 2025. His contact information is listed in the Federation Newsletter under the Endowment Fund Committee, Financial Advisor.

The committee would appreciate responses by January 1. 2025. The committee will prioritize proposals and recommend those to be funded in 2024-25 to the federation executive committee for final approval. Unfunded acceptable proposals will be saved for the next year when additional funds will be available.



Rock Of The Month: Calcite

.Calcite is a common yet fascinating mineral found in a variety of geological settings, from sedimentary rocks to hydrothermal veins. Composed of calcium carbonate (CaCO3), calcite has played an important role in human history, particularly in the fields of architecture and art. The ancient Egyptians, Greeks, and Romans used calcite extensively to carve sculptures, make pigments, and construct temples and buildings. Perhaps its most notable historical use is in the construction of the Great Pyramids of Giza, where blocks of calcite, also known as alabaster, were used for their smooth and reflective qualities, giving the structures a shimmering appearance in the sunlight.

In addition to its historical significance, calcite stands out due to its unique optical properties. One of the most intriguing characteristics of calcite is its ability to demonstrate double refraction. When a clear piece of calcite is placed over text, the words appear doubled—this optical phenomenon occurs because light traveling through the crystal is split into two separate rays. This property has made calcite essential in scientific instruments, especially during the 19th century, when it was used to create Nicol prisms, a crucial component in polarizing microscopes. The famous Iceland Spar variety, known for its transparency and perfect cleavage, was particularly valued for this purpose.

Beyond its scientific uses, calcite boasts a variety of fun facts that make it a favorite among collectors and geologists alike. Calcite can be found in a rainbow of colors, including white, yellow, green, and even pink, depending on the impurities present during its formation. It is also the main component of stalactites and stalagmites in caves, forming stunning natural sculptures over thousands of years. Interestingly, calcite is even found in biological formations, such as the shells of marine organisms and the skeletal structures of corals. With its versatility and presence in both the natural and human-made worlds, calcite remains a mineral of immense historical, scientific, and aesthetic value.
