



NFMS SUPPLEMENTAL RULES TO THE AFMS RULE BOOK

1.1 The AFMS Rule Book updated to January 1^{st} of the year of the show applies.

1.2 The Rules for judges to follow in scoring are listed in the AFMS rules.

1.3 Disqualifications can only be made by the Rules Chair.

1.4 Ribbons shall be awarded to entries showing the group in which the exhibitor has entered.

1.5 All other awards shall be given out as listed in the AFMS Rule Book.

1.6 Winners of any NFMS trophy are not eligible to compete in the same class until the third annual show thereafter.

1.7 In all cases the decision of the Rules Chair shall be final.

NFMS SWEEPSTAKES PLAQUE

Sweepstakes Award. A Special Sweepstakes Award plaque will be awarded to the Master Exhibitor who has scored 90 points or above in any Division. This will be judged by a team of judges appointed by the Rules chair. They will make the decision on the winner.

NFMS SOCIETY PLAQUES

Large Societies in competition. The highest scoring Large Society will have their name put on the perpetual NFMS Large Society Plaque.

Small Societies in competition. The highest scoring Small Society will have their name put on the perpetual NFMS Small Society Plaque. Both of the above plaques may go home with the winners. Both plaques must be returned the following year to be awarded again.

NFMS SUPPLEMENTAL TROPHIES

2.1 Supplementary trophies are sponsored by club/societies or individuals. And approved by the NFMS Executive Board and Rules Committee. In order to sponsor a trophy a check for \$500 has to be deposited with the NFMS Treasurer to open an account for the trophy.
2.2 The NFMS Rules Committee will choose a team to look at all

- exhibits that meet the criteria of the particular trophy.



Public Lands Access

The flames of change sweeping through the Federal Land Management agencies these days are causing eyebrows to raise and voices to rise over what appears to be a total disregard for the health, safety and welfare of our public lands as well as the consumptive and non-consumptive recreational users of our nations public lands.

As our public lands waste away from lack of proper funding and maintenance we are also seeing our parks and forests becoming less user friendly. Being threatened more by the forces of man then from nature. These actions perpetuate a growing feeling that the public's quest for recreational freedom, the enjoyment and pursuit of a wide array of outdoor activities is diminishing and becoming more restrictive not to mention the financial cost to engage in these outdoor recreational activities.

Currently the fuel feeding the fires of concern surrounding our public lands center around a handful of agencies of our federal government. Within the Department of Interior are namely the Bureau of Land Management (BLM); the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) and the Bureau of Reclamation. Also of extreme importance to recreational users of our public forest and grasslands is the U.S. Forest Service, an agency within the Department of Agriculture.

In every state in our NW Federation and throughout the nation, BLM is engaged in revising their public land management policies through a process which has come to be known as the Resource Management plan or (RMP). This plan seeks to modify and restrict access and land use on public lands they manage. An equal endeavor is happening within the US Forest Service which is engaged in reshaping how the public will enjoy and access their National Forests over the next 20 years through a process known as the Travel Management plan (TMP). Not to be overlooked is the US Fish & Wildlife Service who in collaboration with state F&W agencies is impacting the public's ability to recreate and enjoy their public lands by initiating and promoting the listing of certain flora and fauna to the Endangered Species Act (ESA) which impacts the land use not only on public lands but private lands as well.

Let us not overlook another player in the public lands game which is the Corps of Engineers a division of the United States Army which is the chief steward to more than 12 million acres of public lands and waters in our country and the leading provider of water based outdoor recreation.

Numerous reasons exist why our public lands are under attack and why the public's recreational rights to the use and enjoyment of those lands are increasingly being restricted and diminished. One only has to look at federal governments financial affairs to realize were broke and unable to properly fund those commitments made in the past.

Resource priorities and protection seems to have surfaced as the number #1 mission of the vast majority of agencies within the Department of Interior as well as the Department of Agriculture when determining acceptable land use policies and practices. All at the expense of expanding and providing continuing recreational opportunities for the public. Yet the population of America is exploding along with their appetite for recreation and leisure.

There is legislation which has been passed and executive orders issued which border on the abuse of power, which seriously impact the public by ignoring their right to take part in the decision making process and shape new policy, it's time that we really reevaluate the multitude of agencies that control and manage our public lands. We are living in a new age, a new century and we can no longer operate and maintain the status quo. It's interesting to note that between the USFS who controls 193 million acres, the BLM who controls 264 million acres and the National Park Service which controls 87 million acres, this represents nearly a 1/4 of the entire land mass of the US. Already this year the president has added to the warehouse of public lands, five new national monuments using HIS executive power.

It would be fairly easy to provide additional pages of commentary on the status and condition of our public lands in America but the most important and pressing issue I want to leave you with in closing is that you can make a difference. However your choice not to become involved in the process of public land issues whether on a local, county, state or federal level will have devastating effects on your recreational rights in the future. To reiterate what the federation leadership has been saying this year.......HELP, your input is needed. GET INVOLVED! 
